Communication part two ... Shouting and Arm Waving

Last time we looked at the essentials needed to communicate successfully with your Gundog, Voice, Body Language, The use of our arms to give direction and of course the whistle. So now we've got our head around the basics its time to explore how to put them to good use. Learning any new skill is great fun but there is so much to absorb and no sooner do you think you've mastered a skill then something else pops up. First timers to Gundog training and every Top handler in the world will have at some point been through the same confusion, frustration and thoughts of "Ohhhhhh I just can't get this, I'll never be good enough."

The reason I'm using so much of this article to revisit handler enthusiasm and confidence is that it's a lack of confidence that is easily transmitted to your dog. The hardest part of learning to train a dog is that you need to acquire a huge amount of knowledge and skill before you start to train your dog otherwise the communication process between teacher and pupil breaks down really quickly. Put yourself in the position of the dog.....

You're tied on the end of a lead to a Trainee Teacher, one that is not particularly good, who lacks confidence and seems to be constantly referring to a Book, DVD or Professional Trainer. Worse still after each consultation with any of the above the Trainee Teacher comes out and gives you a whole new version of Shouting, Posturing, Arm-waving and as for the Whistle Blowing stuff the poor dog is probably thinking, 'if you blow my eardrums out with that whistle one more time I might just like to shove it right up where the sun don't shine!'...... Not an ideal teacher/pupil relationship.

Most of us start learning to train our dogs about three weeks after the puppy has arrived, already this puts you in a difficult position because you need to know what your doing from the outset. If you are considering getting your first Gundog have lessons, go to training clubs but really importantly ensure you get some real practical training experience before your puppy arrives. This prior knowledge of Puppy management will make things much easier for you and your dog.

Try to make sure you know what to expect from your puppies development and training before it gets to that point. So once again learn skills before you need to put them into practice. I know it's not the way most of us go about our dog training education but it really does make sense to be well informed and practiced before you try to teach anything to your pup.
